#### Board Actions:

- 1. Call to Order Jack Gibson, Chair, calls the meeting to order at 9:40 a.m.
- 2. <u>Public Comment</u> No public comments.
- 3. <u>Approval of Agenda</u> The agenda was unanimously approved.
- 4. <u>Approval of Minutes</u> The minutes of the previous NBWA Board Meeting were approved with one abstention.
- 5. <u>Treasurer's Report</u> Judy Kelly, Executive Director extended special appreciation towards Cheryl Howlett, who prepared the February Treasurer's Report while out of office. All member dues have been submitted at this time.
- 6. <u>Director's Report</u> Judy Kelly announced that in place of this month's Directors Report, the new NBWA quarterly e-newsletter has been released. This newsletter will highlight NBWA projects, NBWA member agency programs and projects, relevant news and events. NBWA staff request member participation to provide recommendations on desired newsletter topics. Jack Gibson underscored the importance of communication between NBWA agencies, and commented that this form of communication is the most valuable asset the NBWA can provide. - Coyote Creek and Bothin Marsh Dredge Sediment Reuse Demonstration Project Roger Leventhal, of Marin 7. County, presented on the results of a NBWA funded feasibility study examining the opportunities, constraints, and costs of beneficially reusing dredge sediment to restore marshland in Marin County. This study examined two Sea Level Rise (SLR) adaptation techniques: thin-lift placement of dredge sediment and coarse-grained "beach" edge treatment at eroding edges. These adaptation measures would specifically address a lack of sediment in marsh habitats which results from the separation of natural sediment connections between the marsh and the watershed. In order to maintain marshes under SLR conditions it is estimated that millions of tons of sediment will be required around the San Francisco Bay. Pilot-scale projects which reuse sediment from flood protection channels will be vital to develop cost effective approaches to sediment reuse. This study estimates that to implement a pilot-scale project to restore the marsh reusing sediment at this site would cost approximately \$1.1 million. The feasibility study will be posted on the NBWA website as soon as it is available. Q: How many agencies would require permits to perform this feasibility study? A: Permits would be required from USACE, DFW, and many more to address concerns about impacts to threatened and endangered species. Q: Does the sediment have to be tested for contaminants? A: Yes – absolutely. Q: Would this type of project interfere with much loved bike paths and other open space? A: Potentially. This pilot should be done as a parallel effort to the open space planning effort.
- 8. <u>Update on Restoration Authority Activities</u> The San Francisco Bay Restoration Authority will be distributing Measure AA funds to projects surrounding the San Francisco Bay. Judy Kelly, (along with

Grant Davis, Roger Leventhal, and Susan Gorin) have been appointed to the Restoration Authority's Advisory Committee to represent the North Bay. The Restoration Authority's Board has approved Advisory Board procedures and agreed to rotate meetings in the region. Advisory Committee members will have input by advising on project evaluation. In order for projects to qualify to receive funding they must protect, enhance, and restore habitats along the Bay shoreline. If projects meet the previously mentioned criteria, they may also be provided with funding for flood management and public access multibenefits. Funds will be allocated partially based on geography (50% of funds will be allocated based on proportion to population), and partially based on final guidelines. The deadline for submitting projects to be added to the project list for 2017 is March 10<sup>th</sup>. The project list will be updated on an annual basis. - 10. <u>NBWA Proposed Letter to State Board</u> Judy Kelly provided the NBWA Board with the opportunity to engage in pending discussions on the health of San Francisco Bay by providing comments which underscore the importance of freshwater flows to the health of San Francisco Bay. She presented a draft letter addressed to the State Water Resources Control Board [SWRCB] asserting the need for additional freshwater flows which would become part of the comment process to the SWRCB on pending amendments to the water quality plan for the San Francisco Bay/Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta Estuary. During February, Board members reviewed the draft and provided their comments to Judy, who incorporated these comments into the letter. Jack Gibson asked for consensus to approve this letter. *This letter was approved by the NBWA Board and will be sent to the SWRCB*.

## April 2017 - Director's Report

#### **NBWA Business**

- The Advisory Committee of the San Francisco Bay Restoration Authority met for the first time in February and the Committee got right to work on reviewing the staff proposal for grant procedures detailing what types of projects will be eligible for funding, how reviews will proceed, and other key matters. Roger Leventhal and Susan Gorin participated in a procedural document review committee and also provided comments. The next quarterly Advisory Committee meetings will be held in San Francisco on May 12<sup>th</sup>.
- The next meeting of the NBWA Joint Technical Committee will be held in Marin Municipal Water District's Board Room on Wednesday April 26<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 am to noon. The agenda will center on getting feedback from the Committee on the North Bay portion of ABAG/ San Francisco Estuary Partnership's shoreline mapping project. Ben Bodkin of ABAG will present the work done thus far on shoreline access sites around the North Bay and seek input.
- Progress continues on our NBWA Communication Plan: Using a small amount of the internal allocated project funds, we have an intern now working on reviewing all the outreach materials on the web or otherwise available at our member agencies. We will then review similar materials and programs run by our North Bay partners. The effort will be to catalog all the programs and materials and then determine where the NBWA can assist in highlighting many of these through NBWA newsletters, website, or in our programs or conferences. The intern's work will be completed in the next few weeks.
- A workshop is scheduled for April 11th to introduce the regional working group to the concepts and methods developed by 2<sup>nd</sup> Nature for the **Rural Road Assessment project**. The Board will hear about the completion of this project and next steps at an upcoming meeting.
- Advance planning: In May the Board will hear from three biologists from around the North Bay region about the status of our North Bay fish species; status of the fish and what major projects are underway to build up and support populations. Mark your calendars for a follow up in **October** to May's discussion when the NBWA Board will have a field trip to see the Russian River Fish Ladder and Viewing Gallery run by Sonoma County Water Agency.

#### **Funding News**

- EPA's San Francisco Bay Water Quality Improvement Fund OPEN NOW. The 2017 RFP for this fund is now available and the deadline for submittal is May 10<sup>th</sup>, 2017. As with the current IRWMP round of funding, the focus will be on disadvantaged communities. The RFP is soliciting proposals that will improve water quality and restore wetlands in San Francisco Bay and its watersheds. The RFP expects to make available approximately \$4 million to support projects in the range of \$500,000 to \$2,000,000. Applicants must provide a minimum 50% non-federal match and projects must be within the nine Bay Area counties that drain to San Francisco Bay. Proposals must be submitted through Grants.gov on or before the proposal submission deadline of May 10, 2017 at 9:00pm Pacific Time. <a href="https://www.epa.gov/sfbay-delta/sf-bay-water-quality-improvement-fund-request-proposals">https://www.epa.gov/sfbay-delta/sf-bay-water-quality-improvement-fund-request-proposals</a>
- Integrated Regional Water Management Plan [IRWMP] GRANT APPROVED. On March 28th we received word that DWR had approved the San Francisco region's grant proposal for this \$6.5 million of funding. Once there is a signed agreement, the lead group for this regional effort, Environmental Justice Coalition for Water [EJCW] will contact those who proposed to assist with outreach to put a full working team together as many of the details are yet to be determined for this round.
